Tech Tip: An Appropriate Modern Oil Filter for Your Studebaker

STP oil filter number S25 fits the '63-64 Studebaker 289 and is commonly in stock at Auto-Zone at an attractive price. Considering Studebaker's association with Andy Granitelli and STP in the early to mid-sixties, what more appropriate modern oil filter could there be for your Studebaker? The can is blue and bears the familiar STP logo. While it's unlikely that anyone else will know that your Studebaker is using one of these filters, it might still make you feel good knowing that it's there. It does that for me. Pete R.





Tech Tip by, and Thanks to John Crooks, Member, Kaw Valley Chapter Carburetor Float Bowl Plugs

With our Ethanol fuels the problem of the fuel evaprating in the float bowl resulting in slow starts is a well-known problem. On the Stromberg 2 BBL carburetors used on 259 and 289 Studebaker V/8 engines, fuel loss in the float bowl can also be caused by the two plugs leaking on the bottom of the float bowl. This can often go unnoticed as it leaks onto the intake manifold and evaporates. You can remove the carburetor and have it resealed. A simple fix is to clean the area where the plugs are located and use a gas tank repair epoxy to cover the plugs. J B Weld makes gas tank repair epoxy that works. Make sure it is suitable to stand up to gasoline. Note from Pete Yuen: Do not clean the carburetor owl with lacquer thinner as it will destroy the coating that inhibits the gas from going through the porous "pot metal" known to some as pewter.

HAVE YOU HEARD OF StudeGrip?

By 1963 Studebaker was well along in the process of transforming itself from a single product manufacturer of automobiles into a broadly-based diversified manufacturing company. This was accomplished through the purchase of small and medium sized manufacturers including companies like STP, Gravely Tractors and many others. That pattern was broken when they made the decision to start a new business, manufacturing tungsten carbide tire studs under an exclusive U.S. license that had been purchased from Kovametilli of Finland in 1963. The new division, StudeGrip was formed in 1965. By 1966, the company had formally organized the Studegrip Tire Stud Division and had established itself as the largest maker of tire studs in the U.S..

Tire studs are metal spikes inserted into a car's tires by a special machine extending 1/16th" from the surface of the tire. Studded tires usually have about 100 studs tipped with tungsten carbide which contact the road as the tire rotates.

Following the merger in 1966 with the Worthington Corporation StudeGrip was merged into the Big Four Industries, a division purchase in August 1966 that had been a part of Worthington Corporation (five months after Studebaker assembled their last car in Hamilton). It was well known for producing tire changers, hydraulic jacks and similar automotive and tire repair tools. Big Four used a pneumatic gun to insert StudeGrip studs in tires for anti-skid protection in snow and ice conditions. Several things happened after 1966. First state road crews noticed that the studs were capable of chewing holes in the road as well as gripping ice. Several northern states outlawed their use entirely. Thirty three states imposed seasonal limitations on their use. Most important, tire manufacturers introduced the all season tire. Between this and highway maintenance improving, providing better plowing and salting to reduce the amount of ice on the roads combined to reduce the market for tire studs.

When Big Four was sold in 1969, the tire studding business went with it, ending another chapter in the long history of Studebaker.

My CASO way to fix a broken door remote.

Sooooo.... When I went to put the door remotes back in my 60 Lark, I found out that the driver's side door remote return spring was broken. This is indeed an inconvenience as it then relies on me, the operator, to make sure the door handle gets manually returned every time you open the door; for me this is a safety issue as it could lead to my being unintentionally ejected from the driver seat from time to time if I forgot to do this.

No problem, I give my trusty Studebaker Parts dealer a call and ask if they have one of those spring thingy's that return the latch to where it is supposed to be...nope. Okay, do you have a driver's side remote?... Nope, they haven't been in stock for years, but we do have lots of passenger side remotes! Okay I say, send me two of those, I need a new passenger side one anyway and I can always turn the other one upside down and use it on the driver's side.

When the parts finally came, I rapidly realized that this solution was a stupid idea as you can't just turn a passenger side one upside down and expect it to work on the driver's side. HOWEVER, after close inspection I find I now have the part I need to fix the driver's side remote. Here are the steps I took to fix it:



First, use a prying device to open this baby up



Dismantle the thing a find the broken spring.

Second, do the same thing to the new part you paid big bucks for from the supplier and harvest a good spring.




The only difference is the mechanism, not the spring




Mark to way it goes back together with a sharpie!!

Put the spring back together


Re-assemble the remote and hit the tabs with the welder, just to make sure!


The only thing I would do differently is to paint that spring bright orange before attempting to reassemble the mechanism, this makes it far easier to find after it launches itself off the far side of your messy shop a few times.

What Did You Do to Your Studebaker?

Pete Rutledge — '64 Studebaker Avanti R2

I've begun another adventure on my Avanti. About 50 years ago, the wife of the original owner of my car was driving it on a highway on or off-ramp and ran into the back of the car in front of her. It damaged the body at the right front of the car. Without complaint, her husband had the damage fixed at the local body shop. The repair work remained hidden under paint until earlier this year when I had the paint removed. The repair work was pretty crude—mostly done by slathering on the body filler—in some places an inch thick. The rest of the car is undamaged and I want all of the car to be that way, so I was determined to replaced the damaged/repaired panels with good fiberglass. One day when hunting for replacement body panels on the SDC Forum, a nice fellow from Pittsburgh, PA, offered me an NOS panel that went from the inner edge of the left headlight all the way to the right parking light; he said he would give it to me for free if I came to pick it up. Well, that was one rewarding day trip for Jan and I when we drove from Woodbridge, VA, to Pittsburgh to pick up the panel. Next, I contacted Jon Meyer for the remaining panels. I got a new right headlight bucket and the front two feet of the right front fender (cut from a donor car in Jon's salvage yard) from Jon. Now I am carefully cutting away the damaged panels. Each cut is preceded by study, measurements, and comparison of the old panels to the new panels. One must take note of how the panels fit together. Where two panels come together, they generally overlap and are then glued and filled. When cutting the panels apart, you don't want to accidentally

cut panels that are not being replaced. The old adage of "measure twice and cut once" certainly applies in principle here. Below is what the front end looks like now—it's a little hard to tell it's an Avanti. I hope to show you a prettier picture in the near future.
