



Odds 'n Ends — Pre-vacation Checklist

Nice weather generally means more travelling, more time on the road and more of an opportunity for something to go wrong with your car.

Advance precautions:

You can, of course, make some advanced precautions to make sure you don't run into problems. A lot of them can be made on your own driveway or garage.

The first thing is to check your radiator. Make sure that you have enough coolant. Make sure that your battery is charged and the terminals and posts or side connections are clean and free from corrosion and grime.

Check the oil and transmission fluid, get them up to approved levels. If it has been a few thousand miles or many months since the last oil change, it is time to do it again. When changing the oil, also change the oil filter too.

When checking the transmission fluid, the engine must be operating and warm when you check. Prior to the checking, set the parking brake and have the transmission in neutral. Wheel chocks in front of the wheels would not be considered a bad idea. When checking, the transmission mode is set in DRIVE, When you get out of the car, remember that the engine is running and the transmission is in DRIVE. Walk only beside or behind the car and not in front of it. It is a matter of trust. Do you trust the parking brakes and the wheel chocks that they will keep the car from moving forward? Do not overfill the automatic transmission. If the transmission level is low, just add a little at a time.

Tires: It is important to check your tires. Look for signs of wear, or thinning tread. Do a pressure check on each tire, including the spare tire. Bring the pressure up to the manufacturer's specifications. Remember, if you do have to change a tire, you do need a jack so check to make sure that there is one in the car. When using a jack set it up so it is safe to work on removing and installing another tire. Tire more than 6 or 7 years are considered, OLD. Old tires are considered to be unsafe.

Lights

Have someone start the car for you then walk around the car to check the brake lights, tail lights and head lights. Any burned out bulb is to be replace.

Shock absorbers:

Push down hard on the fender of the car. If the car does not come back to level or the car keeps bouncing up and down, the shock absorbers needs to be replaced.

What else:

Remove the air filter, tap it on the ground a few times to knock out the dust. If it is still dirty, change it.

Test the brakes while driving. If the pedal goes to the floor or very near the floor, the braking system needs to be checked out. You do not want this to happen out on the highway so do it close to home.

Bring extra keys, just in case you lose a set.

Keep windshield clean, both, inside and outside especially if you are driving towards the sun.

FROM RICHES TO RAGS

One 1936 Studebaker President magazine ad stated: "Styled Throughout by Gifted Helen Dryden". In her day she was the best, however, her story is somewhat sad and thought provoking as to how her career ended so abruptly.

Helen Dryden was born on November 26, 1882 to a wealthy Baltimore family. Her future as a socialite in a prominent family was cut short with the failure of the family busi-Soon after the business failed the family moved to Pennsylvania where she attended the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts to study landscape art. She soon found her real interest was 18th Century French design and dress. Sometime in 1908 she moved to New York City to show her fashion portfolio to the publishing industry. After numerous rejections she was hired by Vogue Magazine where she flourished until 1923. It was at this time she became a trendsetter for the social elite while becoming the highest paid female artist in America. Her first encounter with Raymond Loewy, who was also a fashion illustrator, was also at this time. It is worth noting that she was cultivating a second career as a Broadway costume designer.

By 1929 her influence on automotive design is documented in *Automobile Topics*, a weekly automotive news

magazine. In 1930 she appeared with several celebrities in a Studebaker ad that stated "styled as befit champions by those whose word in art carries authority". (Author's note: There's that name "Champion" that Studebaker would name their last all new car in 1939).

In 1935, in an article about the New York Auto Show in the *New York Times*, Ms. Dryden is listed as an industrial design and style expert. The following year she and Raymond Loewy were contracted as design consultants by Studebaker. Her salary at this time was reported to be \$100,000. This relationship continued through the 1938 model year, in which the Studebaker line was reported as the most beautiful car manufactured by the *Magazine of Art*.

By 1940 Helen Dryden's art deco style was no longer fashionable and with the pending war, she was no longer in the limelight. Her future was beginning to change at age 58. She was now on welfare and would be until her death in 1972. Although a sad ending, she should be remembered for her contributions: in the art world for her fashion designs; three of the most beautiful Studebakers ever manufactured that bore the red lazy "S" emblem that she created; and most of all that women could function in a man's automotive world. She also realized that women were important automobile consumers and that cars should be attractive to this segment of the buying public.



Justifiably so, her work was the foundation of things to come as exemplified in the 2018 book *Damsels of Design*, about the ladies who designed auto interiors for GM during the Golden Age of Automobiles.



What Did You Do to Your Studebaker?

Pete Rutledge — '64 Studebaker Avanti R2, 4-speed

My body panel replacement project on the Avanti has gone slowly (it was a winter project), but that did give me time to make sure it was done as well as I could do. I think it turned out pretty well. All together I replaced about 60% of the nose panel, the front 25% of the right front fender, and the headlight bucket. The pictures below show the patch panels glued, glassed, filled, and sanded in place.



However, while I thought my fiberglass work was done (and the biggest part of it is done), I did notice an old repair of a break in the lip of the right front wheel well and I am now planning to fix this, too, with a small patch panel. I've asked Jon Meyer for a small piece of the right front fender adjacent to the wheel well from one of his donor Avantis. If that doesn't pan out, I will fabricate a patch. The next major project after that will be shooting the whole car with a sprayable filler (to repair damage done to the surface by soda blasting). Hopefully, I'll have a lot of progress to report in the next issue of The Commander.
